This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

St Paul's is using Charanga to deliver the music curriculum. Each week, every class is timetabled to teach a minimum of 30 minutes of music.

To ensure our curriculum is fully inclusive, we are incorporating charanga's SEND scheme entitled 'Anyone Can Play'. The 'Anyone Can Play Scheme' is a standalone set of progressive units with lesson plans, and is designed to build teachers and teaching assistants confidence in music teaching.

Children follow the SEND programme from Reception to Year 2 which will allow all children to become familiar with the structure of music lessons and give multiple opportunities for success for all pupils.

KS2 are using Charanga's freestyle units which have been carefully selected to each year group. This will ensure that children remain engaged in their music sessions as they progress through school and will be able to apply skills learned in previous years. As outlined in the Model Music Curriculum, moving away from the SEND scheme in KS2 allows teachers to set targets which are deliberately ambitious.

Our Music curriculum long term plan outlines that all KS2 children will have the opportunity to learn 2 different instruments within their whole class music lessons for a minimum of half a term.per instrument (equating to a minimum of one full term)

Children at St Paul's also have the opportunity to learn to sing during lesson time, through whole-school ensemble teaching as well as in individual classes.

St Paul's are consistently working to build relationships with the wider community, such as the Plymouth Music Hub and Rocksteady.

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

St Paul's has offered 1-1 piano lessons for several years and has recently introduced Rocksteady, the UK's leading provider of rock and pop lessons for primary school children. Both of which run during the school day at 30 minutes per session.

St Paul's has also run a free singing club after school for the past few years, which has become increasingly popular within the local community. Run by one of our teachers, who is also a professionally trained singer, the singing club has been invited to perform at various community events, Plymouth CAST events and care homes.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

- Singing Club sang at the Laudato Si Mass at the Cathedral May 2024, Residential Homes.
- SEND children participated at 'Woodfest' a music festival at a local special needs school.
- Christmas and Easter Services in Church and school opportunities for solo, group and whole school performances.
- From R- Year 6 children showcase their singing through Celebration of the Word
- Y6 Leavers' Performance
- Music listening within classrooms to accompany drama, to support other curriculum areas such as history and PSHE. Music as background for art and writing. Music for dance in PE.
- Singing for worship time.
- Singing for fun in the classroom
- Children regularly sing during worship and hymn practices weekly.
- We encourage the children to view and participate in performances from theatre organisations in and out of school

In the future

- Organise a Summer/Easter Musical Showcase/Talent Show- Years 1-6 showcase one of the songs they have learnt from Charanga.
- Continue to Liaise with Local Music Hub sign up for more of the musical opportunities available
- Invite local musicians to visit and perform for us, explaining their journey.
- Continue with CPD to keep up to date with the latest ideas.
- Support for teachers and provide training to improve curriculum delivery and pupil experience.
- Further liaise with and support our Trust schools sharing ideas and offering support. Trust Concert ??
